64. All of your core classes are just down the hall from each other.
65. If you get lost, there are security guards and teachers patrolling.
66. If you are an $8^{\text {th }}$ grader doing a HS sport, is there transportation?
67. Yes, there's a bus and if you miss it, you can take the DASH bus.
68. Are there honors classes for TAG kids and different ones from non-TAG kids, or are they mixed?
69. Mixed but the TAG students have a Differentiated Education Plan.
70. How do you get into TAG?
71. Email Stacy Palmer. There are TAG options at the MS that don't exist in the ES.
72. Application is similar as in ES. That's to get the Differentiated Education Plan.
73. Anyone can be in an honors class.
74. What's the homework load like?
75. It depends on your teacher. It's not too bad, especially because of the $A / B$ schedule. At times, it can be a lot. It's a huge step up from elementary school.
76. How much reliance on computers?
77. Depends on the teacher.
78. Better than elementary school - more paper and pencil in math.
79. Do you have text books?
80. Yes, but we don't follow up on them. Mostly use pamphlets and study guides.
81. What's an Anchor Period?
82. You have it every single day. 45 minute blocks. Good for the complicated subjects because you revisit the materials every day.
83. Do you get breaks in block scheduling?
84. No.
85. One ELA teacher tries to give small breaks.
86. Joy - coming from a parent perspective
87. Important to use the PowerSchool app and help students navigate it.
88. The kids learn how to advocate for themselves. No Thursday folders.
89. Canvas pages have all the links to intramurals and afterschool activities, and it's for the students to navigate.
90. Take what your kids say with a grain of salt and if something sounds not right, follow up with an adult at the school.
91. I brought GMWS PTA info and car decals ( $\$ 5 /$ decal).
92. Approve January 2023 Meeting Minutes (available on the PTA website georgemasonpta.org) -- approved
93. Principal's Update (Dr. Oliver)
94. School is closed on $3 / 13$ (PD day) and $3 / 24$ (Teacher Work Day), then spring break is first full week of April. Teacher Work Day on 4/10.
95. Mr. Hershberger ( $5^{\text {th }}$ grade teacher) and his wife welcomed a baby girl on Friday.
96. Changes for upcoming school year
97. We don't have any teachers leaving.
98. K: We have 3 classes this year and we will have 3 next year.
99. $1^{\text {st. }} 2$ classes this year, and there will be 2 next year.
100. $2^{\text {nd. }} 3$ classes this year, and that will go down to 2 classes.
101. $3^{\text {rd. }}: 3$ classes this year, and that will stay 3 classes next year.
102. $4^{\text {th }}: 3$ classes this year, and that will go down to 2 next year.
103. $5^{\text {th }}: 2$ classes this year, and that will stay at 2 teachers next year.
104. Primary changes for next year: 2 classes in our building will house an autism program. Teachers for those classes will come from another building.
105. Reduction means we'll lose 2 teachers. No one has indicated that they want to leave but they still have time to make that decision. If none decide to leave, the teachers will go to teaching positions at another building.
106. Reduction is related to our enrollment decreasing.
107. K: 47 this year; 58 next year
108. $1^{\text {st. }}: 49$ this year; 46 next year
109. $2^{\text {nd }}: 58$ this year; 45 next year
110. $3^{\text {rd. }}: 58$ this year; 54 next year
111. $4^{\text {th: }}: 53$ this year; 52 next year
112. $5^{\text {th }}: 45$ this year; 49 next year
113. There are class size caps and they're different from different grades; lower for younger kids
114. 304 students projected for next year
115. We'll have a FT psychologist next year
116. We will not have an instructional assistant who will support $1^{\text {st }}$ grade.
117. Questions from Parents
118. Is the autism program brand new or coming from another school? Another school but we don't know which one.
119. Do parents/school staff have any say in this? No, it's up to the central office.
120. I'm worried about the impact this will have on the academics at GMES. I know it's not your decision, Dr. Oliver. There's an opportunity at school board meetings to provide feedback and ask Qs.
121. How are the projections established? It's formula-driven. I can't say exactly how these numbers are derived. That's a good question for the superintendent.
122. If the numbers change and actually grow, is there flexibility? If it increases, a teacher will be added. We'd have to move the Mason Market. We're slated to move out of this building in fall of 2024.
123. How many students will be added through the autism program? I don't know.
124. How can we organize to help you and the teachers, Dr. Oliver? Dr. Oliver will gather some info and share it via Geoff and ParentSquare.
125. This seems to be a problem with George Mason. Is it? No, there are other schools with declining enrollment. Before redistricting, we had too many students for the building.
126. Does this change plans for the new building, which is for 600 people? Every time a new school is built, there's the possibility of rezoning.
127. Are these the same formula and caps as before COVID? That's a good question. I don't know.
128. I looked at the budget book provided to the school board. Why do we have all of these coaches and interventionists when we actually need more teachers? Can we have some team teaching? Consider has been given to that, but that's a different process. Those FTEs are separate from the teachers.
129. How are these decisions made? They come directly from HR.
130. How do you make the decisions about which teachers need to leave? Last hired, first to go.
131. What are our 4 specialists doing? I have a son struggling to read and I can't get a specialist to help. Right now, we have an academic coach. She supports teachers, model lessons. We have a reading specialist who focuses on the lower grades. We have a math and STEM specialist for K-2 and another for 3-5.
132. Any chance the autism program is for preschools? I don't know; we'll find out.
133. Please send Geoff any additional questions that can be shared w/the superintendent.
134. Dr. Oliver - our actual budget is more next year (~\$60K) b/c of the psychologist and the cost of benefits increased.
